1 in 3 female Idahoans between ages 50–74 are not up to date on their breast cancer screening — meaning no mammograms in the past two years. With early detection critical to survival, those numbers need to improve.

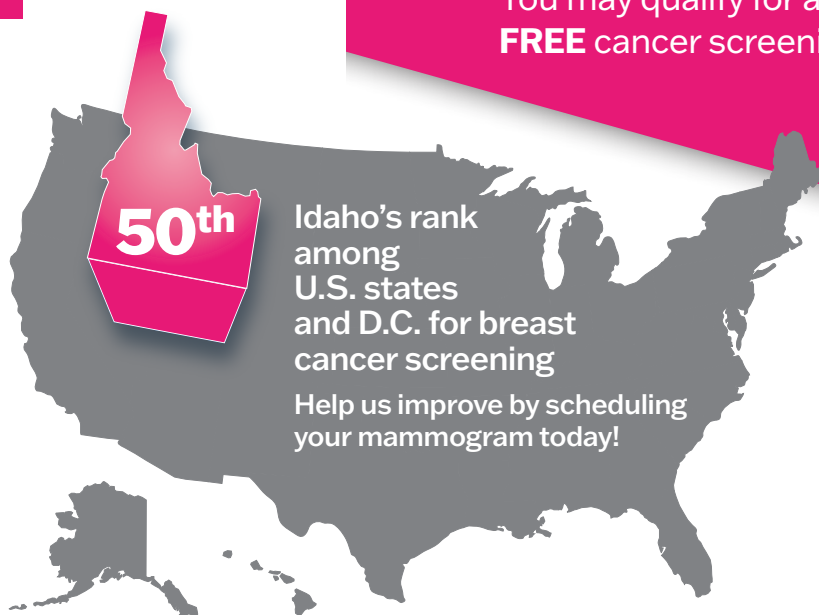
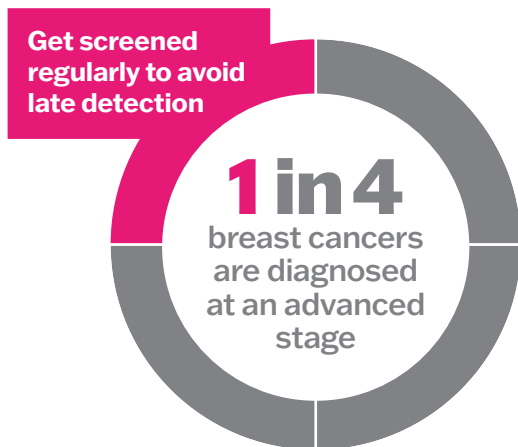
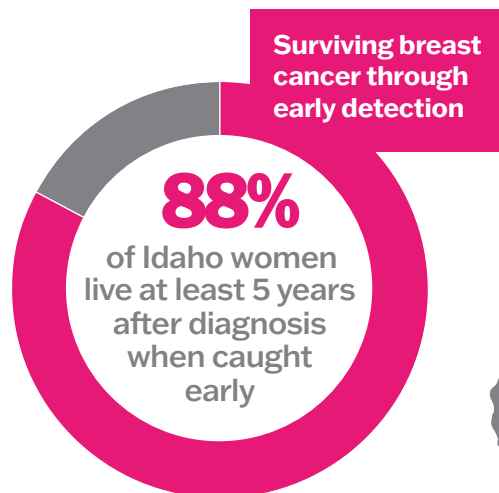
THINGS YOU CAN DO:

- Develop a screening plan with your provider.
- Women with average risk for breast cancer should get a mammogram every two years starting at age 40.

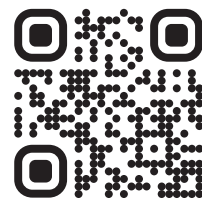
